## MATCH FUNDING CHALLENGE THROUGH THE SALT ARCH



### Preserving the Past - For the Future

Salt is normally considered a preservative, though in our case it is a suitable case for treatment, rather than the cure! Rather than helping preserve something, it needs our help. How can you help us? The Trust needs to find some £60,000 this year to complete the final design stage to RIBA Stage E and to complete the final cost plan, prior to establishing a procurement strategy and implementing a tendering programme.

That's the project planning jargon completed - what we also need are pledges towards our match funding requirements to ensure we have a cash flow over three years, from April 2007 to add to the £4.96m awarded by the Heritage Lottery Fund which will enable all the work to be completed

Our new web site will keep you informed about how our fundraising is going - log in regularly to check progress. A diagram will use the salt arch as a barometer of our fund raising efforts. The original arch was constructed across Witton Street, Northwich in 1897 to celebrate Queen Victoria's Diamond Jubilee. The supporting blocks were made from rock salt and can be equated to the HLF award of £5m - each of the white salt blocks can be sponsored by grants, business sponsorship or you. ### Prehistoric and Roman Coastal Salt Making in Britain

At the beginning of June, Andrew and Annelise Fielding, Allan and June Hughes, John Hughes and Krithia Roberts from Anvil Pottery, spent time with Tom Lane of the Heritage Trust for Lincolnshire recreating salt making on a salt marsh at Wrangle, Lincolnshire with the permission of farmer George Danby. Also assisting was Tom Trew who was shadowing Tom Lane as part of his school work experience.

The practical work ended with a day of lectures in Boston on 10th June where other speakers included Elaine Morris, University of Southampton; Tom Lane, HTL/APS; Stephen Rippon, University of Exeter; Sarah-Jane Hathaway, Bournemouth University; Steve Willis, University of Kent; and James Fawn, Colchester Archaeological Group.

Three salt hearths were constructed. The first was a tried and tested experimental hearth using fire-bricks to make a superstructure to support replica salt pans based on those found at Ingoldmells, as we have done before at Marston (1 right). The second hearth was made using clay dug from the marsh (1 left). Tom Lane and Tom Trew also dug two brine cisterns and lined them with clay in the manner of structures which have been excavated, completing the appearance of a Lincolnshire salt making site (2). The hearths were explained to visitors (3) who experienced the process of heating the brine and the methods which may have been used to concentrate the strength of the brine as well as crystallise and harvest the salt (4). As the hearths were dismantled at the end of the day the technical design and construction could be seen, showing the specific shape of the pans and how they were set up with their tops levelled by using a ball of wet clay between the supporting pedestals and the underside of the salt pans (5).

The third hearth we built (below 6) was smaller and based on a site excavated at Langtoft, Lincs where interpretation of the evidence suggested that the salt pans were subjected to direct heat from the fire, rather than indirect heat suggested by the other reconstructions. We used compressed peat briquettes to heat the pan with great success. Keep an eye out for this salt pan as it may feature in the next series of the BBC programme 'Coast' demonstrating the art of sea salt making using ceramic containers.

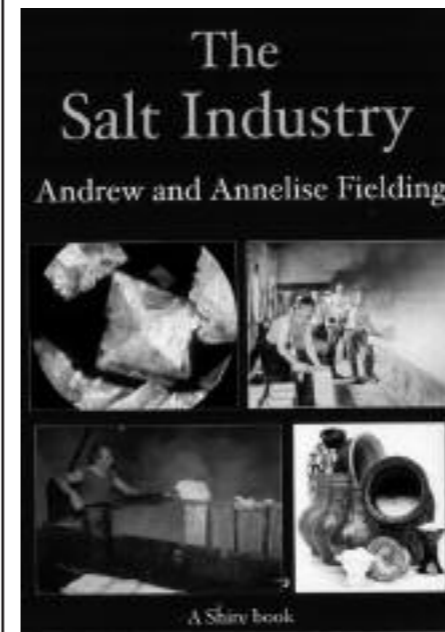

If you would like to be one of the first to buy a copy leave us your contact details and we will let you know the date and time of the launch.

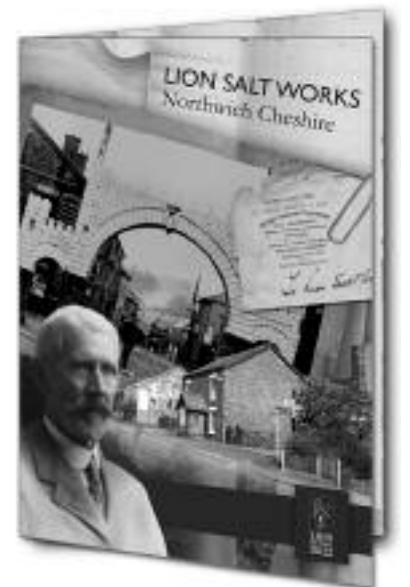
### New Trustees and A Proposed Salt Court

The Trust has seen changes on its Trustee Board. Cllr Lloyd has been replaced by Cllr Charton from Vale Royal Borough Council and Cllr Mrs Dolphin has replaced Cllr Mainwaring from Cheshire County Council.

Trustees are seeking to attract leading members of the community and business to support our fundraising targets through the establishment of a Salt Court. The role of the Court would be to support and direct our match-funding target of £2m.
